The Song of the Martyrs

You're all familiar with the Christmas song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" I think. "The Twelve Days of Christmas" was written in England as one of the "catechism songs" to help young Catholics learn the tenets of their faith as a memory aid, when to be caught with anything in *writing* indicating adherence to the Catholic faith could get you imprisoned.

The songs gifts are hidden meaning to the teachings of the faith. The "true love" mentioned in the song doesn't refer to an earthly suitor, it refers to God Himself. The "me" who receives the presents refers to every baptized person. The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ, the Son of God. In the song, Christ is symbolically presented as a mother partridge which feigns injury to decoy predators from her helpless nestlings, much in memory of the expression of Christ's sadness over the fate of Jerusalem: "Jerusalem! Jerusalem!" The other symbols mean the following:

- 2 TURTLE DOVES = The Old and New Testaments
- 3 FRENCH HENS = Faith, Hope and Charity, the Theological Virtues
- 4 CALLING BIRDS = the Four Gospels and/or the Four Evangelists
- 5 GOLDEN RINGS = The first Five Books of the Old Testament, the "Pentateuch," which gives the history of man's fall from grace
- **6 GEESE-A-LAYING** = the Six days of Creation
- 7 SWANS-A-SWIMMING = the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit and the Seven Sacraments
- 8 MAIDS-A-MILKING = the Eight Beatitudes
- 9 LADIES DANCING = the Nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit
- 10 LORDS-A-LEAPING = the Ten Commandments
- 11 **PIPERS PIPING** = the Eleven faithful Apostles
- 12 DRUMMERS DRUMMING = the Twelve points of Doctrine in the Apostle's Creed

And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord.

THE PROCLAMATION OF EPIPHANY

Dear brothers and sisters,

The glory of the Lord has shone upon us, and shall ever be manifest among us, until the day of His return. Through the rhythms of times and seasons let us celebrate the mysteries of salvation. Let us recall the year's culmination, the Easter Triduum of the Lord: His last supper, His crucifixion, His burial, and His rising celebrated between the evening of the ninth of April and the evening of the twelfth of April.

Each Easter – as on each Sunday – the Holy Church makes present the great and saving deed by which Christ has for ever conquered sin and death.

From Easter are reckoned all the days we keep holy. Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will occur on the twenty-sixth of February.



Immaculate Conception Daybreak Transitional Housing for the Homeless 2019 Annual Appeal

For nearly 30 years, **Immaculate Conception Daybreak of Elmhurst** has rented apartments to house homeless families. This is a self-supporting ministry, funded solely through personal donations.

IC Daybreak commits to pay rent and utilities every month for the **FIVE** units it provides to those in need. Mentors meet with these families on a weekly basis to teach budgeting and life skills. Families transition out of these apartments within a two-year period. Since inception, **IC Daybreak has helped 80 families transition from homelessness to self-sufficiency.**

We have recently added a new family to our program and two families will transition


Spiritual Classics



Safety Procedures

In mid 2019, the Deanery provided us with a template for safety procedures during Mass. Parish Council and Worship Commission put together a team of Safety Ministers made up originally of Ushers and Mass Captains. Safety Ministers then met to create the safety procedures relevant to our Church and Chapel This should be viewed as a great start, but the program must continue to develop and build on the original efforts. What do we need? More Safety Ministers. The greatest offense in Safety matters is PRESENCE. The more Ministers present the better.

If we had more Greeters, Ushers, or people who have experience in CPR, fire, security, nursing, police, or ALICE Training, you can be a great help. You may never need to do anything, but it will be beneficial for Safety Ministers to know who the doctor, nurse, security, or CPR trained person is in Mass. IC Mass Safety Procedures

Medical Emergency

al Emergency Safety Minister 1 attend to the injured person.

Safety Minister 2 to call 911

Depending upon severity of the situation, a Safety Minister or the Priest may ask for any medical professionals in the congregation to step forward.

- Team members should be standing by to offer assistance to first responders. AND one Safety member to stay with the injured person.
- HAVE THE INJURED person stay in the same position until an ambulance arrives.
- Ushers will watch inventory of a first aid kit- water, band aids, Neosporin, Kleenex, Glucose tablets. And tools like mop, bucket, paper towels, etc.

Fire

Safety Ministers to know location of all exits, alarms, and extinguishers.

In the event of a fire, Safety Minister 1 to activate fire alarm, Safety Minister 2 to call 911. Safety Minister 3 to attempt to put out fire with extinguisher- if practical.

- If necessary, team members to direct attendees to nearest exit.
- Extra Safety Ministers help or get help for the elderly
- Team members to perform a final sweep of the building to ensure it is empty.
- Go to nearest place of Safety, use the High School(?) as a safe place for minors without parents AND a designated meeting place for all.
- Safety members to make Presider aware of need to evacuate

Intruder

All Safety Ministers should have a cell phone and be prepared to call 911 if needed.

- Ideally have an Usher outside or near the glass exit doors with Usher badge on before and during Mass. Also could serve as one of the Greeters.
- A good offense is 'Situational Awareness'. Know what a normal crowd looks like so you can identify non-normal people or events. i.e fidgety stranger.
- Per Captain Joe Puckett- a) presence, b) verbal commands, and c) 'soft hands' takes care of 99% of all intruder issues. Might have to repeat a verbal command 2 or 3 times. www.churchsecurityanswerman.com
- If concerned about a person, have an Usher sit behind the person. Also alert other Ushers of concern about the person's presence.
- If there is a heightened concern about the person, call 911.

Structural Failure

Usher to call 911.

Evacuate.

Team members to assist parishioners, directing them to the proper exits.

Team members will perform final sweep of building.

Tornado

- Should the tornado sirens sound, team members should lead worshippers to the designated shelter in place area. i.e Hallway outside Plunkett Hall, away from windows.
- If the siren sounds as Mass is ending, team members should strongly urge parishioners to take shelter in the designated area until the danger has passed.
- Tornado shelter for Church is the stairway leading up to the second floor of the GS and the GS hallway.
