




March Prayer

- Give up bitterness; turn to forgiveness.
- Give up hatred; return good for evil.
- Give up negativity; be positive.
- Give up complaining; be grateful.
- Give up pessimism; be an optimist.
- Give up harsh judgments; think kind thoughts.
- Give up worry; trust Divine Providence.
- Give up discouragement; be full of hope.
- Give up anger; be more patient.
- Give up pettiness; be more mature.
- Give up gloom; enjoy the beauty all around you.
- Give up jealousy; pray for trust.
- Give up gossiping; control your thoughts.
- Give up sin; turn to virtue.

Please remember that on March 27th and 28th we will have 18 Hours for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Especially during the season of Lent, come and receive the grace of God's mercy. On the weekend of March 28th and 29th, we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick for all those in need. Let us pray that there will be many healings of spirit, mind, and body in our community during those days.

Brothers and Sisters,

A few days ago, I was talking with someone about the book of Job; Specifically about the question "does Job really submit to God's will?". As we all probably know, this fascinating book deals with the problem of the suffering of the innocent and with the meaning of suffering in general. In this month of March I offer you a quick review of this biblical book so that we can be more interested. As we are immersed in the season of Lent, this book can help us to meditate and grow throughout our spiritual journey.

The experience of Job for many people in today's society seems to be a story of injustice and great suffering, undertaken by the powerful or even by God Himself. On the contrary, I would say that the story of Job is not a rebellion against God's will, instead it is a story of total submission to God, as we can see throughout the whole book. The book of Job is one of the greatest stories in the wisdom literature. It has an amazing outlook regarding human suffering in the world; the justice, the punishment to the evildoers, the trust in the will of God, and of course, the total and disinterested subjection to God's will. The book tells us the story of a just man, Job, who praises God and offers sacrifice for the possible offences of his children. God exalts his good behavior among his members of the divine council. All of Job's material things perish, his children die, his wife abandons him, and he loses his health. Despite all of these events, and even though his wife advises him to curse God, he remains faithful to God. At this point of the book, we can testify that Job submitted to the will of God using the answer that he himself gives to his wife; "We accept good things from God; should we not accept evil?" (Job 2:10). Even in adversity he believes that all things are in God's Hands, and God will render whatever God deems fit.

Then, in this scenario of suffering, Job is visited by his three friends. They came to offer consolation and council to him. Thus far, Job seemed to be suffering quietly and in his friends are quietly too. But in chapter three Job explodes in a storm of laments and cursed the moment in which he was born saying, "Perish the day on which I was born, the night when they said, the child is a boy!" (Job 3:3). Under those circumstances, the three friends could not remain silent. One by one, each of his friends give him an answer to which Job had a replay too. Despite Job's confidence in God, from time to time he falls into despair, saying "As God lives, who takes away my right, the almighty, who has made my life bitter" (Job 27;2). He blames God for all his suffering saying; "His wrath tears me and assails me, he gnashes his teeth against me." (Job 16:9). We easily can conclude that Job does not submit to God's will, but, we have to consider that it is just a way to go through the suffering and his way of trying to understand his afflictions.

By the chapter 32, another important character appeared, Elihu, whom according to the scriptures is a young man. He impetuously and impatiently upbraids Job for his boldness toward God, as well as the three friends for not successfully answering Job. Elihu defended the justice of God tries to show that Job is wrong with his accusations. What Elihu is doing is reaffirming the law of retribution that the other friends were appointing. However, Elihu locates the suffering in the divine plan and anticipates the content of the divine speeches.

Job, conscious that he was right, demands an answer for his suffering from God Himself; (Job 31:35) "let the Almighty answer me" to which God responds with a series of questions regarding how the universe works. He asked him if he is able to run it. God shows Job how grand and amazing the world is, a lot of things that we might see every day but really don't understand at all. God knows everything in a perfect way. God shows Job that the universe is a vast and complex place in which He is paying utmost attention to each detail and to each creature. God has his eyes on all of it. Job, on the other hand, has only the small outlook of his life experience. His view is very limited. What looks like divine injustice from the point of view of Job must be seen in an infinitely larger context. Job is simply not in a place to claim injustice or to accuse God. It is important to realize that God does not give a direct answer to Job, but with all the things that God showed him, Job understands that he has been treading on mystery. God is the provident but nonetheless the mysterious God of creation. Also, he understands what the prophet Isaiah said; "For my thought are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways –oracle of the lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, my thoughts higher than your thoughts" (Is 55:8-9).

All things considered, we can be assured that Job submitted to the will of God completely, because with all that he lived and all that God showed him, Job was left in a place of humility. His submission to God is completely disinterested and pure, based solely in his relationship with God, not on some promises of reward. His complaint is just about vindication and he is not concerned about possessions. Job is now the sort of person that no matter what comes, good or bad, he can trust fully in God, as we can see in chapter 42:3-6 "Who is this who obscures counsel with ignorance? I have spoken but did not understand; things too marvelous for me, which I did not know... Therefore, I disown what I have said, and repent in dust and ashes."

Brothers and sisters, I wish you the best throughout all your activities in this month of March and the Lent season. I reiterate my thanks to all of you for your prayers. As well, I can assure you of my prayers for the success of all your many projects and the well-being of your families.

A letter from Brian Geary

It's hard to believe that Lent is already here. Most of us are still getting over the Christmas season. It seems like the parties have just ended, and the decorations were only put away a few weeks ago. The weather certainly hasn't changed, and we're still in the dead of winter. Easter and spring seem so very far away. Yet the Church in her wisdom asks us to enter even more deeply into what might already seem like a penitential period.

Let's consider what the Church holds up for us as the three "hallmarks" of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. For many of us, fasting is the most obvious practice we take up during Lent. Of course, we fast from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all other Fridays during Lent. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday also provide us the opportunity to undergo a more rigorous fasting – abstaining not only from meat, but by taking only one "normal" sized meal, and two smaller ones. Fasting allows us to confront directly our own weaknesses, our own humanity. Why is it we never want a cheeseburger more than on a Friday during Lent? It is also customary to "give up" something else from our lives. Maybe its snacking, the internet, or TV. Maybe it's Starbucks, or the music you listen to in your car on the way to work. Pick something that will challenge you, and also help you grow. In all of this, we see that removing a good from our lives allows us to focus on the sole giver of all that is good: God. God cares for us in our weaknesses. We see that he provides for us, even when we can't have that snack or that Frappuccino (I'm partial to Caramel Frappuccinos myself), or when we want to flip on the TV for a few mindless hours. In all of this, God shows us what is really valuable – a relationship with him.

Lent is also a time for what is traditionally called "almsgiving." This means giving to those in need, whether monetarily, or through donations of other goods. At IC we have the opportunity every year to support St. Mary's Mission in Red Lake, Minnesota. What if we took the money we saved by fasting from Starbucks and donated it to the mission? Above all, let us be open to the different ways God may call us to serve others in need this Lent. He will not fail to surprise us with opportunities!

We cannot forget prayer. Because Lent is a time to focus primarily on our relationship with God, prayer must take front and center. And there are many practical steps we can take! Maybe it's an extra five minutes in the morning or before bed. Maybe it's waking up a little earlier and coming to one of the two daily masses we have here at IC. If we give up something that takes up our time, say browsing the internet or watching TV, maybe we use that time for silent prayer, the rosary, or reading a good spiritual book. Perhaps you haven't been to confession in a long time – here at IC we will be offering 18 hours of confession on March 27th and 28th. It doesn't matter how long you've been away – God is waiting to show you his love and mercy.

We cannot end without briefly mentioning Easter. While during Lent, we walk with the Lord through his bitter passion, so too at Easter do we share in his resurrection. In the Christian life, there is no death without a resurrection. When we die to ourselves in little ways, through the giving of our time, our fasting, and our service, we are certain that God will give us the joy of sharing in a new life with him.

May God bless you and your families during this Lenten season!

Lenten Regulations

1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

2. All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

3. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

4. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

5. Lent is the principal season of penance in the Church year. All of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial (in addition to following the Lenten regulations), serious prayer, and a performance of works of charity and mercy.


Those who are sick, pregnant, or nursing, or whose health would adversely be affected by fasting or abstinence, should not consider themselves bound by these norms. Lent 2020

IC Lenten Outreach Project

Our Lenten alms bags will be distributed on Ash Wednesday. Bags will be available in the narthex and rectory thereafter. Once again, our alms will benefit St. Mary's Mission in Red Lake, Minnesota. As we know, St. Mary's lost their church in a devastating fire in November, 2018. They are struggling to keep their faith community together as they move ahead with plans to rebuild. As we pray and fast during the Holy Season of Lent, let us also "give back" to God, who has given us so much. Over the past few years, our alms have helped the children of St. Mary's Mission School in various ways. We have donated computers for all of the classrooms, which resulted in higher reading, math and testing scores. We also established a scholarship fund for those unable to pay full tuition. We provided funds to furnish a "sensory room" for the students, which is now operational. Funds have been used to implement a seventh-grade classroom. Last year, funds were used to establish an eighth-grade classroom and "baby space," both of which are now operational. This year, our funds will be used to help rebuild the church for the children living on the reservation. As we know, family is the foundation for passing along the Catholic faith to children. The family's attendance at Sunday liturgy helps form the lifelong thirst and love for our faith. The church space is also used for children's Masses during the school week, much as our church at Immaculate Conception is used for high school and grade school liturgies. We need your help in offering these children HOPE for their future. Let us prayerfully consider what we can give to St. Mary's in their efforts to build and strengthen the faith of the children and their families on the reservation and beyond. We are pleased to announce that Fr. Jerry will be present at our liturgies the weekend of March 14/15. Checks should be made payable to Immaculate Conception, with a memo for St. Mary's Mission. Alms will be collected on Palm Sunday in the narthex.




Cod for God!

Adult Faith Formation

On Sunday, March 1, our Catechumens, Isaly Martinez, Stephanie Quach and Christina Rolon, will be "sent" from Immaculate Conception to the Cathedral of St. Raymond in Joliet for the Rite of Election that afternoon, celebrated by Bishop Richard Pates. They have affirmed their intention to be baptized and receive the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. The following Sunday, March 17, our candidates will participate in the Penitential Rite. Candidates are those who are baptized Catholic but have not yet received the Sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation. Candidates also include those who were baptized into another Christian faith tradition and now desire to join the Catholic Church. The celebration of this rite presumes that the candidates are approaching the maturity of faith and understanding requisite for fuller life within the Catholic community.

The Sundays during Lent are especially significant for those completing their Sacraments of Initiation. Over the next several Sundays, our Elect (those who will be baptized, receive Eucharist and be confirmed) will celebrate the Lenten Scrutinies. It is the primary way that the Church assists her in their conversion process during Lent. These ritual celebrations on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent are communal prayers celebrated around the Elect to strengthen them in overcoming the power of sin in their lives, while helping them to grow in virtue. The parish community does not scrutinize the Elect; the Elect scrutinize their own lives and allow God to heal them.

Taking seriously the dynamic of scrutiny and conversion gives us a richer perspective of Lenten "giving up." What we are to give up more than anything else is sin, that which keeps us from living out our baptismal promises fully. Along with the Elect, we all need to approach the season of Lent by asking ourselves what needs to change in our lives if we are to live out the gospel values that Jesus taught us. Our journey through these forty days should be a movement ever closer to Christ and to the way of life he has exemplified for us. As we listen to stories about the woman at the well, the man born blind and the raising of Lazarus, we ask ourselves "for whom/what do I thirst? Do I recognize Jesus as the light of the world and ask him to remove my prejudice and complacency, allowing me to see the needs of others? Will I accept Jesus' offer of new life?"

As a parish family, let us prayerfully journey with those who will receive the Sacraments of Initiation. We pray for Isaly Martinez, Stephanie Quach, Christina Rolon, Jacob Gunther, Isabella Bernardi, Nathan Macias, Ksenya Kelly and Ryan Kelly.

Lord, we pray for those in the RCIA process who journey to you. Open their hearts to the fullness of your love. Deepen their understanding. Set their hearts on fire for the kingdom of God. We ask this through Jesus, who is the Way, the Truth and the Life for all. Amen.


